

We must continue to work at bringing in new members. Our new International President Patti Hill's agenda is to have 1.5 million Members by 2025 (Mission 1.5). Continue to market and publicize your events so people will want to be a member of your active club. Remember we are members of Lion's International that volunteer our time and service to the good of others.

Fellow MD6 Lions,

We will all be hearing a lot about Mission 1.5 over the next few years. The mission is that by the year 2027 we will have 1.5 million Lions worldwide, up from our present 1.4 million Lions.

Obviously, the more Lions worldwide the more humanitarian needs can be met.

So, how do we accomplish this? Lions Clubs International President Dr. Patti Hill says "we need to change how we run our clubs. If we want to entice the younger members, we need to look at things in a different light, otherwise Lions as we know it will cease to exist."

In the past it was felt if you were going to be a member of a club you needed to attend every meeting. If you can't make the meetings, we don't want you in our club. This does not necessarily work with the younger generation of today, which by the way are very much needed and the future of Lionism. **As Dr. Patti says**, "**Be the Change.**" Many of the younger Lions have difficulty making meetings but are right there to step up and do club projects. We need to be sensitive to those needs and not shut them out. Just because they can't make regular meetings, does not make them less valuable as Lions.

I recently heard a comment from a membership chair of a club. They gave one of their ideas at a meeting and quickly was told "**That will never work!**" Really, how do you know it won't work? Instead of shutting down your membership chair, be supportive. You elected your membership chair to do a job, let them do it. Be ready to step up and help if they ask, don't be critical of their ideas, but embrace them.

Instead of shoving a membership application in someone's face when you first meet them (in the past we were taught that) invite them to a project. Let them see how Lions make a difference as well as the Fellowship in doing a project together. A lot is accomplished by example.

Today our clubs are small. The days of 50 to 100 members have gone by the wayside. I would like to see our clubs join together and share a project or help one another with a project. **Teamwork**. Let a prospective member see a couple of clubs working together, how impressive is that to see. We not only help out our fellow Lions, but the Fellowship and FUN is what it is all about as "**We Serve**."



Great news Lions! This year we are starting the year with an 85% of clubs of MD6 reporting but we still need to change the mindset of some clubs to report. Why should we report? That is the mindset that we are going to change this year. We need to start being proud of what we do in our communities and we need to start not being the "best kept secret". We have been told to not brag on what we do and where has that gotten us? It is amazing when we get together and celebrate as Lions we brag about what we have done, what we are doing and what we are going to do but we tell non-Lions what we do but we don't show them.

Lions International *"Why report service"* suggest by sharing our impact, Lions and Leos inform, inspire and grow our global legacy of service.

It also, strengthens storytelling. Details give stories power. Saying you fed 87 families is more powerful than saying you organized a food drive. Saying your club contributed 1,265 volunteer hours last year is more powerful than saying your club serves the community. When your club reports service, you collect the details needed to share powerful stories of your club's impact.

Inform decisions and documented club achievements reveal what's working and what's not. For example, what if your diabetes education program is growing in attendance, but your annual club fundraiser is shrinking? Reviewing past service reports helps your club make better decisions, including choosing service activities and setting realistic goals.

Inspire service Your reported service projects can be viewed within your district and around the world. That means your club's creativity and impact can inspire Lions and Leos to embrace new causes and serve in new ways. Reports also help Lions International staff identify best practices to share globally.

Please keep up the GREAT WORK and let's get the 100% by October 2023!!

On July 27 an international conference on low-vision and blindness concluded in Denver. The conference, hosted by The Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute, brought together professionals and researchers from around the world who shared their research and ideas about ways to improve the lives of people with low-vision and blindness.


Over the course of four days, 25 Lion volunteers, working with the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute Foundation, helped 550 conference presenters and participants register, check into conference rooms, and find their way around the large event, including a number of people who use canes to navigate. In addition to assisting, many Lion volunteers were able to listen to the presentations and learn more about vision impairment. At the end of the conference, numerous attendees personally thanked the Lions for their help and many of the Lion volunteers told us that they had a wonderful time helping. The Lions Districts of Colorado and Wyoming, the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Institute Foundation, and the Lions Clubs International Foundation together provided more than \$5,000 to help support the conference, including sponsorship of a free coffee and snack service that was very popular with participants and a Lions information booth.

A Day in the Life of Paige, RMLEB Recovery Tech Coordinator Lead

When Paige Stockard started with the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank, she never thought her favorite part of her job would be talking to people. In fact, it was the thing she was most afraid of when she started. Now it's one of her favorite parts of her job as a donor recovery coordinator lead.

"I never would have expected I would be good at talking to people," she said. "I did not think I was going to be able to do that coming into this job, so it being one of my favorite things now is one of the things that I am most grateful for learning."

As a donor recovery coordinator lead, Paige is part of the Rocky Mountain Lions Eye Bank (RMLEB) technical team. This team manages the hands-on work that makes what we do possible. Members of the technical team recover eye tissues from deceased donors at the beginning of the donation process. At the other end, they also prepare tissue for surgeons' individual transplant needs and ensure it makes it to its destination.

Between these two ends of the donation process, technical coordinators oversee everything. Donation is a process with a ticking clock. Ideally, corneas should be recovered within 8 hours after a donor has died. Once recovered, an eligible tissue must be placed with a surgeon within 14 days. This means coordinators are interacting with donors' next of kin, hospital staff, coroners, funeral directors, surgeons, transport and shipping personnel, and everyone between donor and recipient to ensure the donor's gift of sight is honored.

The technical team is integral to fulfilling the organization's mission.


Paige came to this role for both professional and personal reasons. As a life-long lover of science, she plans to earn a master's degree in genetic counseling. She wants to be able to empower others to make informed medical decisions and sees the work here as an excellent experience in pursuit of that goal.

But RMLEB wasn't her introduction to the world of organ, eye, and tissue donation.

"I was also really drawn to the field of donation because my dad was actually a double lung recipient," she said. "I know that eyes are not the same as lungs, but just working in donation makes me feel connected with my dad. I feel like I'm able to say 'thank you' to my dad's donor. It's very fulfilling in that way."

As we continue the fight against diabetes, this platform will revolve around three basic strategies - that it is possible to prevent Type2 diabetes largely through healthy lifestyle choices; that all three types of diabetes can be controlled with clearly defined control measures and successful management plans; and that research allows us to bring innovative support models and treatment techniques to people who need it most. And, thus, our project to raise funds for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation (JDRF)—the largest research-based organization with an emphasis on Type1 diabetes.

There are 3 types of diabetes - Type1, Type2, and Gestational - and we're fighting all of them. As Lions and Leos, we can do much to prevent diabetes and improve the lives of those who already have the disease. As a club, district and multiple district, we can commit to making choices that can prevent diabetes. We can also create club, district, and multiple district challenges. Even small, simple things can make a difference, especially with 1.4 million Lions and Leos focused on the same cause. The key is to continue to support those affected so we can have an immediate impact on our communities and do our part to fight this deadly disease.



The MD 6 council moeting is scheduled for May 3rd following the board meetings.



365 Health Announces Closure After 40 Years of Dedicated Service

After four decades of unwavering commitment to the health and wellbeing of the Colorado community, the Board of Directors for 365 Health (previously \$Health Fair) has announced its decision to cease operations. The organization's Board of Directors made this difficult decision after careful consideration of evolving community needs, financial challenges, and the broader healthcare landscape. The Board is exploring transitioning its remaining assets to another communityfocused organization.

Since its inception as 9Health Fair in 1980, 365 Health has played an integral role in promoting better health and providing vital medical services like free and lowcost health screenings, prevention tips and educational programs to countless individuals. 365 Health has been a steadfast advocate for accessible and equitable healthcare. During the COVID-19 pandemic, 365 Health shifted its focus from health screenings to providing hundreds of vaccine clinics throughout the state. The organization also launched Health in Hand, a telehealth service. To reflect its broadened mission, the organization changed its name to 365 Health in 2022.

"It is with mixed emotions that we announce the closure of 365 Health," said John Kelley, Vice Chair of the 365 Health Board. "We are incredibly proud of the positive changes we have brought to countiess lives in our community. However, the decision to close was reached after thorough evaluation of the challenges we face in continuing to meet evolving needs in a sustainable manner."

Kelley commended the 365 Health team for their commitment to delivering preventive healthcare to those who have needed it the most. "Their dedication, compassion and energy has been unwavering and countless lives have been saved over the years," he said.

The dissolution of 365 Health is effective Sept. 1, 2023. The Board of Directors will spend the month of September implementing a transition plan that will include meeting 365 Health's financial obligations, finalizing existing grant requirements and seeking vendor partners to carry out existing services, such as vaccination clinics.




